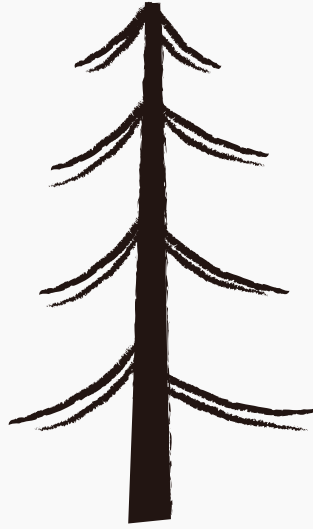

DANNY PACKER

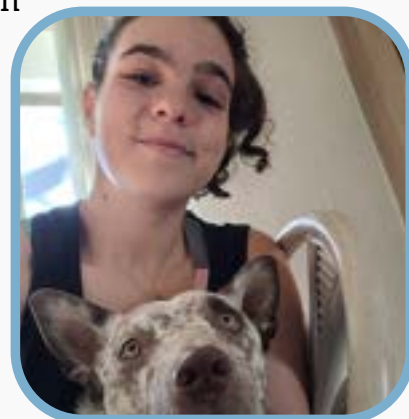

Karen is now a clinical social worker seeing patients in private practice. She is licensed in New Jersey and Maine and is a certified lifeguard. Karen has four sons who all have gone, are going, or are currently working at Kawanhee! She is delighted to be part of this new and innovative Camper Support Counselor program and looks forward to meeting the campers!

As we are seeing in schools throughout the country, children and teens face unprecedented stressors in school, communities, and the country as a whole. Kawanhee has always been a place to disconnect from school stressors and reconnect with ourselves and each other. In order to best support both campers and staff alike, Rohan and Karen, using Evidence Based Practices and counselor feedback, have developed specific social and emotional programming goals for the summer. These benchmarks thoughtfully aim to provide additional skills and resources to help campers and staff feel supported, safe, and able to work through challenges.

Rohan and Karen will begin their work in pre-camp counselor training. Here, developmentally appropriate interventions and situational based training will be taught. Self-care practices such as the benefits of proper nutrition, sleep, and physical health will also be facilitated. These concepts aim at teaching foundational skills that allow access to a fulfilling Kawanhee experience. Additional emotional/mental health support will also be available throughout the summer cultivating an inclusive Kawanhee environment for all. Karen and Rohan, in collaboration with our camp Mom, Debbie, are committed to creating safe spaces and additional support so that all who call Camp Kawanhee home can prosper, grow, and be the best versions of themselves. 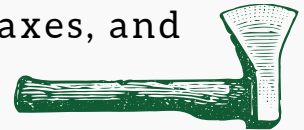

I'm writing to you from Fort Collins, CO as I finish up another crazy off-season of life and college.

When you see me next, I will be a graduate of Colorado State University, having officially ended my career as a student, for now. These transient moments in life -- or to invoke another fancy buzzword -- the LIMINALITY I am feeling now is pretty surreal and awe-inspiring. There's so much to be excited about on the horizon and as always, another season at camp is at the top of my list.

- *Do you believe that your time as a counselor impacted your decision to pursue this career?*
 - I'm working as a school-based therapist in Rangeley, ME for the regional K-12 school. I credit Kawanhee as the place that crystalized my love for working with children and youth. I recognized this passion during my years as a Junior Counselor, where I saw the importance that a positive role model can have in terms of alleviating conflict, providing safe spaces for children to grow and working together as a group to accomplish goals and have fun. For me, Kawanhee was the perfect environment to connect, engage and further hone my skills working with children that has now led me to my current job.
 - Thus far in my career, I have worked in an outpatient health clinic, a substance use treatment center, a jail and now a school setting. In all of these environments I have found that I rely on the social and emotional skills that I first learned while spending my summers on the shores of Lake Webb. As a quiet kid growing up, Kawanhee gave me a safe space to fail, learn and grow into myself, without which I believe I would be a remarkably different person.

- *Do you believe that your time at Kawanhee may have impacted your acceptance into college in any way?*
 - Yes. Working as a Junior Counselor in charge of a lodge, and with trainings such as LGT and JMG. In turn, that compelled me to pursue other certifications and leadership experiences which were helpful in how I projected as a mature student, citizen, and leader.
- *Can you please elaborate on a way your time as a counselor has affected your career?*
 - It influenced my leadership development. In counselor meetings, Mark Nelson used to say that no matter how bad our day might be going or when we are preoccupied with something else, when a kid is having a hard time—no matter how big or small—we must put ourselves to the side and be fully present and available for that camper, always. I reflect on that very direction all the time with my own teaching faculty in their work with our students, attributing it to my work with Mark Nelson at Camp.

- *How has your time as a counselor influence your college life?*
 - Working as a counselor at Kawanhee has been really helpful in navigating my school and outside commitments. First, I don't know many jobs for college-age students that are given as much leadership responsibility as a Kawanhee counselor. We are running activities and responsible for the happiness of a bunch of younger boys. And we aren't just doing that for 3-4 hours a day or even 8 hours a day. We have to be "on" 24 hours-a-day over a 7-week period. That experience has really helped my stay engaged in longer term projects in other areas of my life.
 - Kawanhee helps you stay open-minded about people. In a span of three years, you go from being a master camper to a senior counselor. I know that some of the older counselors who have been around for a while may still see me as the "camper" I was a few years ago. I needed to prove myself that I could be their peer. And likewise, now I need to be open-minded about the group that follows me. I know this is valuable in work settings because it reminds me that I need to prove myself as I develop while also staying open minded about my co-workers.

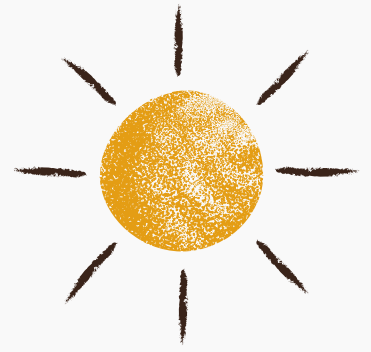

- *Do you believe that Kawanhee may have impacted your acceptance into graduate school?*
 - I wrote one of my MBA applications about Camp! Here's an except from my application:
 - "Forty 10-year-olds watched as we lowered Marvin into the ground on a late-summer night in Maine. Marvin was dead. 'Dead' might be dramatic; it was Marvin the Mango's gradual rotting that led to the funeral at summer camp. Carlos, one of my campers, had found a mango which he named Marvin and carried everywhere. Many exchanged bewildered looks as they observed the human-mango friendship, but I saw opportunity. I pitched an idea to my lodge: casting Marvin as the protagonist of our Skit Night play. Everyone grinned and began brainstorming the winning performance. Although Marvin decayed years ago, their legacy endures: we were voted 'Most Spirited Lodge' and I continue to be guided by the value of community."
- *What is one way that Kawanhee has impacted your adult life that may be most unique to you and your story*
 - I learned the importance of always being your authentic self. In middle and high school, I certainly felt pressure to conform to what I perceived as the pervasive culture in my schools, one centered around "being cool," superficiality, and materialism. Getting to Camp felt like a detox each summer, where I could be myself without fear of being judged nor any drive to conform. Each camper was celebrated, often the weirder the better (as evidenced by our chants, "let's get weird").
 - This pure celebratory "glass half full" attitude is a big part of this. We would chant in the dining hall to celebrate the most basic accomplishments. Treating life in this way is a positive and fun vibe to spread, and is one I have incorporated into my teamwork style (when appropriate)."

OBITUARIES

Charles ("Chuck") Arthur Compher 1946-2023

Charles "Chuck" Compher, 76, of Haltom City, Texas, passed away peacefully on January 21, 2023, surrounded by family. Chuck first came to Kawanhee as a camper when his mother Liz was camp nurse. He developed a strong interest in archery. He completed all 15 medals given by the Camp Archery Association, at the time only the ninth Kawanhee camper to accomplish this feat. He then went on in 1961 to achieve the coveted Robin Hood Award, the highest Kawanhee archery award given. He was captain of the Maroons in 1963.

He returned to Kawanhee in 1984 with his wife Barb, he as Director of Archery and she as camp secretary. They remained on the senior staff for 23 years. Chuck taught middle and high school band for nearly 50 years. He put his musical background to work by being one of those who played evening taps.

In addition to archery, Chuck had a passion for waterskiing. He brought his own boat up from Texas each year and was often out skiing at morning first bell.

He is survived by Barb, his beloved wife of 53 years, and their three sons, as well as six grandchildren. All three sons were Kawanhee campers, counselors, and winning Grey/Maroon captains!

James "Jim" Estabrook 1954-2023

Jim Estabrook passed away peacefully at age 68 with his beloved wife Dorthy (Dotty) at his side. He was originally from Bexley, Ohio. He and Dotty lived in Westerville, Ohio for many of the 38 years of their marriage. He will be remembered by all who knew him for his friendly smile and easy going manner.

Jim was profoundly deaf from infancy. Despite this challenge, he graduated from Ohio Wesleyan majoring in mathematics and earned a master's degree in deaf education from Ohio State. He taught deaf students for 12 years before his interest turned to computer web design. Following stints working for AOL and Nationwide, he became the webmaster for the Vineyard Church in Columbus for 12 years.

Jim grew up spending summers at Kawanhee where he was a camper and then counselor from 1965 to 1973. He achieved the Expert Rifleman award, the highest of the awards in range, in 1971. Dotty too joined the Kawanhee family and worked in Nature as Director of Lapidary for 30 years beginning in 1985. Jim was often able to take time from his job in Columbus to spend time in the summer with Dotty at Kawanhee.

Jim loved to be outside and take long walks. He was an avid runner and completed several marathons.

He is survived by his wife Dotty and his siblings John (Iris), Richard (Ann), Kate (Ferd) Schoedinger, his sister-in-law Lesley Jones, and many beloved nieces and nephews.

Carolyn Kindle 1936-2023

Carolyn Fuller Kindle passed away at the age of 86, on Saturday, February 25, 2023, with her family by her side. Carolyn was a beloved member of the Camp Kawanhee community, having spent three summers working in the camp office from 1978-1981 in Weld, Maine, while her sons, David and Tom, attended camp. She fondly remembered quiet morning boating trips to the tip of the lake to search for a moose, the early morning dips in the lake as part of the Polar Bear club and the church services on Sundays near the shore of the lake. She valued the friendships she forged there. She is survived by sons David and Tom Kindle and their respective wives Jacque and Jennifer and the Grands (Tom and Jen's children) Elise, Andrew, and Collin.

William Fleming 1935-2023

Dr. William Hare "Bill" Fleming of Bennington, NE passed away peacefully on April 12, 2023.

Bill was born and raised in the Upper Arlington area of Columbus, OH. He graduated with honors from Yale in 1957 where he was an All-American swimmer.

Bill knew from the age of 11 that he wanted to be a medical doctor, and from the age of 12 that he wanted to be a surgeon. He earned his medical degree from Columbia University. While in medical school, he watched a procedure on a child, and at that moment he thought, "This I could do. This I understand."

He began his professional career in Atlanta, GA where he became Chief of Thoracic Surgery at the Veterans Administration Medical Center and taught Surgery at Emory University School of Medicine where he practiced as a heart surgeon for five years

In 1976, he was offered a position in Omaha where he became Nebraska's first and only congenital heart surgeon dedicated to treating children. His dedication and collaboration with pediatric cardiologists there laid the foundation for a regional heart program at Children's Hospital & Medical Center of Omaha which today is nationally recognized as one of the best programs of its kind. Bill often described his work simply by saying, "I fix children's hearts," and by doing so he saved and improved countless lives. In 2009, Bill was named a Pediatric Legend for his work at Children's Hospital & Medical Center.

Bill attended Kawanhee as camper and then JC for 6 years, 1946-1951. He was awarded the "Champion" Ribbon in Sailing yearly 1947-1949 and then worked as First Assistant in Sailing in 1950 and 1951.

In 1948, in an incident that was to become a part of Kawanhee lore, he was among a group returning from Katahdin and riding in "Bate's Bouncing Buggy" when it went off the road and tumbled down an embankment 35 feet into a river. Fortunately he sustained only minor injuries and all involved recovered well.

Bill treasured his memories of summers spent at camp, often returning for week-long visits and reunions. During his retirement, he and his wife Pam traveled extensively throughout the world, visiting all continents except Antarctica. Continuing his childhood passion for sailing learned at Kawanhee, he and Pam enjoyed annual Windjammer sailing cruises for 19 years.

Bill is survived by his loving wife of 28 years, Pamela; his children: Alice Fleming Guzick (Bill), William "Will" Swift Fleming (Kelly), Edgar Hare Fleming (Lynn) of Omaha, April Brizendine of Omaha, and Krystal Talha of Omaha; along with his grandchildren and a great granddaughter. He is survived also by his sister, Jeanie Fleming, as well as many extended family members.
